On September 1, 2015, Culinaire transitioned into the four Carnegie Museums of Pittsburgh after participating in a very competitive bid process involving all of the country's top food service providers. When we received the

request for proposal, we knew we were the perfect fit to achieve the goals they outlined in their document.



History

Before Andrew Carnegie founded Carnegie Museums in 1895, he imagined a place where individuals and families could learn and wonder about their world, past and present, through fantastic fossils, ancient artifacts, and great works of art. He imagined, too, a place that would foster ongoing exploration and discussion through the work of scientists, artists, and curators. Today, the four Carnegie Museums are all that Andrew Carnegie imagined, and more. In 2014, the museums reached 1.34 million people, including 350,000 school children. And

they brought to Pittsburgh more than 130 special exhibitions, films and theater shows, and live performances. Most importantly, by their own examples, they challenged and inspired their audiences to see the world through a bigger, broader, more colorful lens.

Carnegie Museums Today

From rock groups to Campbell's soup, from T. Rex to submarine decks—the four Carnegie Museums are home to hundreds of thousands of objects, including some of the world's great art and the remains of the Earth's largest prehistoric creatures. Most importantly, they're the participants and the hosts of daily exploration—onsite, out in the community, and around the world. They are Carnegie Museum of Art, Carnegie Museum of Natural History, Carnegie Science Center, and The Andy Warhol Museum.

We operate 4 cafes, a bakery, and execute catered events up to 500 guests on a daily basis on the four campuses.
